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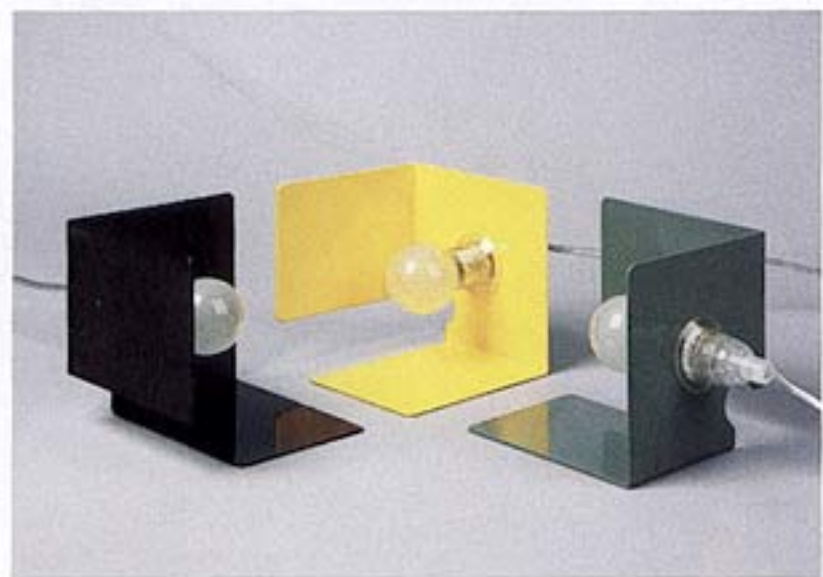

**SLIM CHANCE ◀****Handcarved walnut chair**

Shelly Shelly – a name surely destined for fame – is a California Art Center College of Design student whose 'Loft' chair for Bernhardt was shown at the ICFF. The experimental but robust form created a buzz largely because it came from a student. It's not that students aren't capable of great things, simply that this work is so grown up, encapsulating a wealth of US and European design heritage. Handcarved in walnut, using laser scanning to reproduce the design, 'Loft' succinctly merges traditional craftsmanship with modern technology. 'go-go' lights are made by the pleasingly named German company, Pling. The 'go' refers to the right angles of the three-sided design.
